

# Radiation Therapy - Skin

### **Radiation Treatment**

- Treatment is painless is similar to getting an x-ray but with higher energy to treat cancer.
- Each treatment takes about 15 minutes it is important to lie still and breathe normally.

# **Possible Side Effects**

Always discuss new side effects with your radiation oncology team.

#### Skin reaction

- Skin in the treatment area may develop redness 2-3 weeks into treatment.
- Only use creams that have been suggested/prescribed and do not apply it on the treatment area at least 2 hours before radiation.
- Use a mild unscented soap and pat or air dry the treatment area after bathing.
- Temporary hair loss in treatment area.
- Use an electric razor if you have to shave.
- Avoid direct sunlight on the treatment area and extreme temperatures such as heating pads/ice packs.
- Avoid scratching or rubbing the skin.
- Avoid cosmetics on treatment area.
- Use a saline compress to help clean and soothe irritated skin. Do not use Epsom salts.

### Saline compress recipe:

- · Heat 1L of water to boiling and remove from heat
- · Add 1.5-2 tsp of table salt and stir until dissolved
- · Cover and leave at room temperature to cool
- · Make fresh each evening

#### To Use:

- · Wash hands
- · Place gauze or clean facecloth in clean bowel and cover with solution
- · Lay gauze/facecloth on area for 10-15 minutes
- · Pat area dry
- · Repeat as often as required

#### Nose soreness and dryness

- You may be advised to use an unscented water-based cream, nasal lubricant, spray or rinse.
- Avoid blowing the nose or putting tissues in the nose.
- A cool mist humidifier may help with dryness.

### Mouth soreness and dryness

- Drink clear fluids, especially water, while eating.
- Avoid alcohol.
- Use a soft or extra-soft bristled toothbrush.
- Eat soft foods with sauces or gravies to ease swallowing.
- A mouthwash may be prescribed; do not use commercial mouthwash.

# **Fatigue**

- You may notice a decrease in energy level rest when needed.
- Eat a well-balanced diet and drink plenty of clear fluids.

# <u>Possible Late Side Effects</u> (can happen months or years after treatment)

- Skin changes occurs in the area where the radiation was given.
- Skin is firm, dry, or darkened in color.
- Can also have permanent loss of hair in the treatment area.
- Fine blood vessels may appear.

# **Radiation Appointments**

Radiation treatments are scheduled Monday-Friday, except on holidays.

You will be scheduled for a *Radiation Review Appointment* weekly when you begin your treatments. At this appointment you may see a nurse, nurse practitioner, physician or radiation oncologist.
